Need a second spare for your wagon? Well, here is a solution for you! Just add a "continental" tire kit to your wagon and you are back on the road in style.

What? You're asking how does the tail gate go down? Well, that's a milliondollar question. Does the tire pivot down or does it pull-up and to the side? When it does move one way or the other, can you still drop the gate down enough to get access to the cargo area? So many questions, so few answers! But perhaps answers will come. Tim Dye (Director of the Pontiac-Oakland Museum & Resource Center) sent your editor a batch of pictures for an assessment. Although many photos were not of high resolution, there are visual clues that indicate that the installation was done post factory production and likely during the period in which this Safari was restored.

Passing Of A Long-Time Safarian

We extend our condolences to the family of Chapter member Brian Bettinger. He was a long time POCI, Badger Chapter, and Custom Safari Chapter member. Friend best described him as a all around fun guy. He owned a 1956 Safari for decades and was friends with many members.

Here is the life story of Brian Thomas Bettinger:

May 4, 1955 to December 1, 2020. Age 65. It is with profound sadness that we announce that Brian T. Bettinger passed away unexpectedly in his home Dec 1, 2020 at the age of 65.

Brian was born May 4, 1955, the son of Bernard and Dorothy Bettinger (Hardaker) in Waukesha, WI. On May 6, 1989 he was united in marriage to his wife, Paula.



Brian moved to Marshfield in 1983 and worked for the Marshfield Police Department for 25 years where he met many of his close friends. After his retirement he continued to work (because his wife said he had to!) at V&H as a driver and O'Reilly's where he got the supplies needed to keep his fleet of vehicles running until his death.

Brian loved cooking and planning parties. Those parties included breakfasts with fellow officers, poker gatherings, graduation parties, multiple wedding receptions, and big garage parties that included many friends. He always made sure no one ever left his company hungry, often sending family and friends off with plenty of leftovers. Unfortunately due to COVID he was unable to see most of his family this Thanksgiving but that didn't stop him from cooking everything he felt necessary and planning a trip to deliver the food to his sister, nieces, and nephew; a trip that will be completed by his surviving family.

He had a passion for old cars and loved to attend any and all car shows, cruises, and swap meets- even braving Texas in the July heat for his very expensive toys. He was a member of multiple car clubs, including the POCI (Safari Chapter and Badger State Chapter) and the local group Specialty Car Enthusiast where he met even more friends. Brian was always happiest when he was able to show off his other children (his cars)



Making History: Chapter Member Dennis Dana

The contributions by Dennis Dana to the POCI's Smoke Signal Magazine is second to none in our club's history. Dennis has devoted hundreds of hours in research and correspondence with many members of our Chapter and POCI officials to interpret and develop a wonderful series of magazine articles. The quality of his efforts is self-evident; just take a close look at his articles published in Smoke Signals over the last two years. But how did is all begin? Let us go way back in time to the summer of 1980. In the June 1980 issue of the *Safari News* (shown below), the front page features the very first article that Dennis wrote, the **\$20.00 Safari**. This was the beginning of a long journey with his 1956 Safari wagon and his passion for Pontiac history.



It's Great To Own A '58! Just Ask Joe Stout!!

If you owned a beautifully restored 1958 Pontiac Star Chief Custom Safari wagon, would you smile? Well, the evidence it clear..... that long-time POCI member. Joe Stout of Sewickley, PA, has been seen with a smile that stretches from cheek to cheek! You see, he is the proud owner of one of America's best road cars of the 1950s, a 1958 Star Chief Custom Safari wagon.

Joe's affection for Pontiacs started back in his high school days when he and his twin brother started hounding their father for a car. They were a Chevy family but after they convinced their father to buy a Chevy, they could not find one. Instead, they come across a 1953 Pontiac. From that point onwards, Joe has been loyal to the Pontiac brand so much that he has made significant contributions to our hobby and the preservation of Pontiac automobiles. Back in the 70s, he searched dealerships and purchased old stock of parts that could have been tossed. By the early 1980s, Joe was seen at Carlisle sway meets selling Pontiac parts. He also had rediscovered his joy with dealership promotion cars. Motivated by fond memories of his boyhood, Joe started in earnest a scale model business that he maintains to this day.

Back in the mid-90s, Joe realized that he really liked Pontiac wagons. By about 2000, he found a '58 Safari needing restoration. He could not resist the opportunity to purchase a rust-free wagon with factory AC. Soon after it arrived at his home in Pennsylvania, he started on the restoration which would last about 6 years. He faced a few typical challenges such as finding parts and getting the body work done right but when





the work was done. all Joe had to do was to replace a troublesome new ignition coil with one that worked well, and he was on the road to Dayton, OH to attend a POCI National Convention. At his Safari's first judging, he took best in Class. Since then, Joe has driven about 1,000 miles per year to car events. Joe says that he enjoys talking to people about his Safari wagon. More importantly, people really enjoy seeing a stunning, seldom seen American station wagon from the 1950s.

During the restoration, Joe added some accessories including power windows, antenna, super rare bucket seats, etc. He had the engine and transmission professional rebuilt but he did the chassis and assembly. The body spent about 2 1/2 years in a shop before it was rescued and completed by a friend.

As you can see, years of restoration work has resulted in a stunning station wagon that makes you look in envy at the colors and fabulous '50s design. Joe has resurrected a moving time capsule that will be enjoyed by many people long beyond our lifespan.

Oh! About Joe's first Pontiac..... believe it or not, Joe still has the car! It survived high school but then sat for a while before Joe purchased the car from his father. get caught-up a few months later by some impacts from COVID-19. But with some persistence, Dan will bring back '58 Pontiac so that he, his family, and friends, along with many others can appreciate this unique, one-year station wagon of the 1950s.

Technical Tip #9

Spark plugs are some of the most important, yet potentially neglected components of your wagon. How can this be true? Well, combustion happens! And when it does,

something is left, and something is taken away!! Mainly carbon deposits and electrode erosion, respectively.

Unless you have a platinum or iridium-based spark plug, your copper core AC, Champion, Autolite, or another brand of spark plug will wear down. Carbon may build every time you run your wagon's engine. To make matters worse, additives in fuels such as a lead substitute, fuel conditioners, and cleaners may leave a coating of residue on the spark plug electrode.

The bottom line...... If you can't remember when you last checked your spark plugs, then likely it's time to take a few minutes to inspect, clean, adjust or replace them. Having clean and properly adjusted spark plugs are essential for best engine performance and service life.

Not all spark plugs perform equally. It is important that you match the heat range of the plug to your engine. When in doubt, refer to the factory shop manual for spark plug specifications. Some plugs are designed as a "cold" plug which are designed to run with higher engine temperatures while others may be "hot" plugs which run in lower temperatures. There are also plugs that run between cold & hot plugs.

So which spark plug is best for your Safari wagon? Since most fuels at the pump will contain up to 10% ethanol or more, a cooler spark plug may be a better way to go. Idle may be a bit 6////////// smoother with a cold engine and start-ups potentially faster. The Champion RJ18YC is a good performing cool plug with a high heat range that is less prone to fouling. But remember, the engines in our Safari wagons are not the same. Some have high mileage while others may be rebuilt. A cooler plug is generally a safe way to go but don't deny your engine possible performance improvements with a hot plug that operates best in lower temperature ranges such as an AC 45S. Regardless of your choice of spark plug, the key is to maintain them by checking, cleaning, and keeping the gap set to .035 inches for most applications.

Bonus Tip: The use of a magnetic socket may reduce dropping or misaligning spark plugs. If you want a new magnetic socket, AutoZone sells a 13/16th socket for 1955-58 Pontiac spark plugs. Price will range from about 5.99 to 7.99. Product #52-138 (3/8 drive). You might find sockets for less cost on-line.

Where to buy:	Most local parts stores, eBay, Rock Auto, Napa, AutoZone, O'Reilly's, Pep Boys, Parts Geek, Kanter Auto, and Ames Performance Engineering.		
Estimate Cost:	Champions RJ18YC, AC 45S, Autolite 86 : About 1.49 to 3.98 retail for standard copper core/tip plugs. More for platinum iridium.		
How to apply:	Removal and installation is straight forward. No need for instructions. However, the use of a magnetic 13/16th socket will likely make removal and installation easier. No fumbling or dropping of the plug and better changes of threading the plug properly on the first attempt. Remember not to over torque the spark plugs!






