




Chapter member Kathy Wheeler took 1st place in the *All Wagon* class for her outstanding '57 Safari.





#### **Chapter Newsletter Challenges; Current & Future**

Back in the 70s when the POCI and our Chapter was created, you needed a hardline dial phone, a typewriter, access to a photocopier and stamps to mail your newsletter. Today, there is a growing competition in the POCI to produce full page color, multipage newsletters that often requires a capable computer,

with publishing software, a large screen, access to high-speed internet service, and printing services. With such changes in technology, tackling the duties of editor has

become a specialty job that requires some knowledge, skills, and abilities to produce a newsletter. The complexity of the job can be a challenge.

We all recognize that change is inevitable. Often change improves our lives but when we use technology to fuel change, we sometime forget that we can isolate those who do not wish or cannot stay in pace with new technology. Thus, we understand that when we ask for help in providing newsletter contributions or taking over the newsletter editor's job, it is a bit too much to ask for some of our members. But somewhere in the crowd, there must be someone who can help us maintain our Chapter. Yes, it takes time, patience, skills, and humility.

The POCI leadership continues to adapt to changes. They recently established judging standards for rating club newsletters, and they have encouraged chapters to increase their presence in social media. These changes are beneficial but they can cause some unintentional impacts. For example, new standards may tend to propel production of newsletters towards lengthy, professional quality publications. Officials must be attentive, understanding, flexible, and enact mid-course corrections when appropriate to assure stability.

The future demands of newsletter editor duties for some chapters may eventually cause some to pause, weaken or disband without a newsletter editor. Without solutions, the future of the POCI may be impacted. One possible consideration is assigning the very few editors who seem to have the means to produce high quality newsletters to become multi-chapter editors. Folk like Thom Sherwood already fills such a role by producing a chapter newsletter while helping with *Smoke Signals* publication.

We are thankful for our Chapter editors for their time and dedication since 1993. They are: Robin Clark (1 yr), Rich Pye (15 years) and Tom Young (13 years). Don't forget the decades that Lou Calasibetta and Robin Petry have invested with their respective positions as President & Secretary/Treasurer. If you have not taken a few moments to thank them, now is a good time to do so.

Then, for your consideration is not a Safari wagon, but a Star Chief 2 door hardtop. This Pontiac is so unique, it warrants newsletter inclusion!

### No other Pontiac produced in 1957 has this interior!

You are looking at GM styling history!

Harley Earl hired women to help refresh GM automotive designs in the 1950s. In 1957 & 1958, women of each GM division designed automobile concepts based on existing production inventory. This "Black Beauty" took center stage in the GM Styling Dome at the *Feminine Show* in 1957. Along with its sister convertible, the Pontiac Motor Division proudly published a press release about the designer, Jan (Jeanette) Krebs, and the unique, trend setting features of her 1957 Pontiacs.






#### Is This Star Chief The Real Thing?

Here are some merits of this Star Chief hardtop:

- It is original, worn, untouched, except a trunk lid replacement and fresh paint in exterior spear.
- The car matches the description published on May 29, 1957, Pontiac Motor Division Press Release; Jan Krebs adds "Woman's Touch" to Pontiac Styling. (see section in red circle)
- The body production, assembly and specialorder numbers fit chronologically for an appearance in the Feminine Styling show.
- The quality and uniqueness of the interior, including custom "star" shaped cloth fabric, stands-out from production and custom builds of the time.
- A unique die-cast stylized emblem was placed on the trunk lid.


This unique styling drawing was created by Duane "SPARKY" Bohnstedt, GM designer and one time Pontiac Chief designer. The other car completed by Jan is a two-door hardtop finished predominantly in Onyx Black, both inside and out, and appeals to opposite likes in color tones. Its regal appearance represents the last word in luxurious interiors and good taste. Seats are styled in calf grain leather and patent leather, with black mouton for the floor carpeting. The car is receiving favorable attention from male car buyers due to its handsome Ivy League looks.

Brian's family is hoping that someone will become the next steward of his well traveled 1956 Safari wagon. His car was maintained for many years by a reputable shop.

1956 Pontiac Safari Wagon. The odometer reads 23901 but the title states exempt so the mileage is not confirmed. This Safari comes with many spare small parts. The exterior shows like it is all original patina. The interior does need some work. It has a 316.6 V8 engine with an automatic transmission, Power steering, Power Brakes, AM radio with a FM converter, and it is an A/C car. But the A/C is not complete. There has been a lot of work done in the past. The engine and transmission have been rebuilt about 5 years ago, the rear pinion seal has been replaced, all new updated wiring from the dash forward, brakes have been all redone in the last 5 years, a new heater cores were installed along with new carpet and the lights have been all upgraded to LEDs. The floor was completely resealed while the carpet was out. The vehicle has all new hoses, and the radiator has been recently re-cored. The starter was replaced, and the generator has been rebuilt. When the engine was rebuilt the exhaust seats were changed to harden seats and the engine is 30 over with a 20/20 crankshaft, new valves, and an updated camshaft. The tires have 8/32-inch tread. The speedometer was rebuilt, the ignition system has been upgraded to electronic (Petronix), the wipers were upgraded to electric, the carburetor has been recently rebuilt, and the gas tank has been flushed, an electrical fuel pump has been installed, new shocks all the way around, an aftermarket transmission cooler, new exhaust with Smithy's mufflers, and aftermarket cruise control. It comes with a lot of shop manuals and the original purchase contract. This vehicle is set up to drive. The rear hatch hinges could use some work and the hatch is very difficult to close. The steering box leaks more when on jack stands. The family is asking \$43,995.00 OBO. We are told only 4,042 of these cars were produced in a three span from 1955-1957. This car was purchased by the family in 1983 out of Oklahoma. This is a great driver that made the trip from central Wisconsin to Minneapolis the past several years for Back to the Fifties auto show. Along with several other long trips including Omro, and Fon Du Lac. We have a third-party appraisal stating the car is worth \$42,000.00. A lot of paperwork and receipts come with the car. 
