

"How I Found My First Safari"

This is the story about how I found my First Safari, and how I came to own the one I have now.

It all started as a young boy growing up in the Midwest, Minneapolis Minnesota to be exact. I was smitten by cars, and had most of the 50/60's cars memorized by trim, taillights, and fin shape & dimension. My older brother (5 years older) was of course, into cars & motorcycles before me, and paved the way. One of his first cars was a Salmon pink '57 Pontiac 4dr. He raced a lot of cars on "Lake Street", the local street drag way in Minneapolis. He was always talking about how that car would outrun a lot of newer cars. Of course I was mesmerized with the 2 tons of chrome, and the Deluxe interior, with all the dashboard chrome & knobs.

Then in 1964 my Dad, an Insurance salesman, brought home a brand new 1964 Catalina 4dr, sedan in a medium metalic Green. My brother would borrow the car on Saturday nights and take that 2V 389 automatic 4dr.out onto Lake Street and go racing again. He would talk about how "Fast" that car went, and by the time I was 16 in 1970, I was ready for my first Pontiac. My unofficial first car was a '46 Chevy pickup truck, but it never ran, and I pedaled it for a small profit, (Shades of things to come-like a lifelong obsession).

So I answered an ad in the Minneapolis Newspaper, and trekked over to St. Paul, and along University Street and OH MY GOD!! Layed mine eyes on that Beautifully Sculptured Piece of Harley Earl Rolling Art!! I just had to have it, and the previous owner and I negotiated a price. I paid \$225 for my first car, a Green & Creme colored 1955 Safari. It came with a 287 2V, and a column shifted 3 speed manual transmission. Even on a good day the column shifted 3 speed manuals were anemic, and this linkage was shot. I still remember driving it home slipping the clutch, and smoke pouring through the floorboards as I shuddered away from the stoplights in 3rd gear!! It happened several times before I caught on how to drive a three speed, much less a worn out one. She was a Dream Ride, factory underseat heater, original 2 tone Green/Creme Leather interior.

Of course I had to put Chrome reverse wheels on the rear, with oversized tires, then came the "Gabriel High Jackers" air shocks. I loved those Vacuum wipers in the rain of the twin cities, always dead stopped when you needed them pulling away from a light in the rain. The car was going to be a street Rod, so I pulled it off the road, while I welded the front clip together, and scraped the sound deadener from beneath the chassis. It sat on & off over the next four years.


Meanwhile I ran through a 1956 Safari, a 1957 Safari, a 1962 Catalina 2dr. Ht, a 1964 Lemans 326 (4 speed 2 dr Ht), a 1964 Impala with a 283, then a full race 348, then a 396, and finally a 327 4 speed. I swapped motors in that car till I wore the chassis out!! So I swapped the HP 327, 4 speed into a 67 Cutlass Convertible, sold everything else, and moved to Denver. But I never forgot that '55 Safari, nor the dream of that unique street rod.

Fast forward 25 years, a marriage, career, 2 children... Oh, Ah, a 1955 Safari for sale down in Tucson Az for \$3300, with a blown engine, burned out hydrodramtic transmission, and blown rear axle. Such a deal, BUT it had a Black Diamond Naugahyde Interior! It had a tri-power '56, 316 Engine, and a B&M Hydro??..Clean, straight, rust free body. I got a Loan, and showed up to "LOOK" at her with a trailer and \$3300cash!! She was mine. It was Pearlescent white, with factory: Power Windows, Padded dash, under hood light, illuminated Hood Ornament, and several non factory options: IE Flared rear wheel wells, Bucket seats, and a lot of Butchery.


As with any restoration there is a lot of work to do. Jack is adding his "Street Rod" options inside and out. Can't wait for the update in the next issue....hint...hint...



January 30, 1956 issue - General Motors model review ad, 4 Pontiacs; also 2 page color ad of six '56 Pontiac hardtops.

Pebruary 20, 1956 issue - 2 page color ad of a 4dr hardtop and Starchief convertible.

March 12, 1956 issue - 2 page color ad of '56 Pontiac wagons; includes the Bafari.
