

Robin's tag is a bit unusual. The paint code indicates PRN. The letter R is what makes the code very odd. According to Pontiac color guides, PPN is the correct "Starlight" Two Tone color for the car - Kenya Ivory lower body with Cordova Red insert & roof. PRN would indicate an Ivory lower with a Carib Coral insert and Red roof. Robin may have to do a bit of paint stripping to determine whether or not the code is in error or that he really has a odd colored Safari. Start sanding Robin!

Everyone enjoyed the gathering so much that plans are in the making for another meeting in early spring. By that time, Robin should have the answer about the paint code!

INSTALLATION OF AIR CLEANER ON FOUR-BARREL CARBURETOR

When installing the air cleaner on cars equipped with the four-barrel carburetor, always tighten the top wing nut with the cleaner top cover centered over cleaner oil reservoir before attaching the silencer brace. This prevents improper seating of the cleaner top cover and the resultant air leak which causes noisy operation.

When the cleaner top cover is removed for service, care should be taken to prevent damage to the lip which contacts the cleaner oil reservoir. Damage in this area will also result in an air leak.

CARBURETOR FLOODING

In the January issue of the Service Craftsman News it was stated that the fuel pump should be replaced if it was delivering in excess of 5 pounds pressure. A study of this condition shows that high pressure may be encountered due to the fuel pump diaphragm being installed with insufficient slack. The corrective procedure to be followed when high fuel pump pressure is encountered on a new car is listed below. If this does not reduce the pressure below 5 pounds, the pump should be replaced.

- 1. Remove pump from engine and place mounting flange in a vise with fuel side up.
- Loosen cover screws two turns to relieve diaphragm.
- With a short section of pipe fitted over rocker arm, move arm up and down several times.
- 4. Press rocker arm up and hold in that position while tightening all cover screws.
- 5. Reinstall pump.

Engineering tests have shown that many cases of Carter carburetor flooding can be corrected by removing the strainer nut (two on four-barrel) and using air pressure to blow out any dirt particles that may have accumulated under the float needle. CAUTION: DIRECTING FULL AIR PRESSURE INTO BOWL MAY COLLAPSE FLOATS.

ROUGH ENGINE IDLE AND HIGH VACUUM WHISTLE

Several reports have been received on rough engine idle and/or a whistling sound under high vacuum conditions, such as closed throttle coasting. Investigation shows that these were due to loose intake manifold bolts and nuts. In all cases of the above condition, tighten intake manifold bolts and nuts to 40-45 lb. ft. torque before further investigation.

CORROSION OF TERMINALS WITH RESULTING SHORT CIRCUIT - PARKING AND SIGNAL LAMPS

For a short period, parking and signal lamp assemblies were used which may become corroded in the socket areas and result in a short circuit. As soon as this condition was discovered, changes were made to eliminate the entrance of moisture.

This is to advise that in cases where a short circuit occurs, and there is evidence of moisture having been in the socket or on the reflector below the socket, that the lamp body and wire assembly should be replaced with a new one. These parts, 5945817 L.H. and 5945818 R.H., are listed in Group 2.899. Flat rate operation 12-340 applies on the replacement of the body assembly.

Inspection for evidence of moisture can also be made visually through the lens at any time when a car is in for service or when a bulb is being replaced. In all cases where evidence of moisture is found, the lamp body and wire assembly should be replaced.

TIRE INFLATION - SAFARI STATION WAGON

The tire inflation chart given on page 21 in the Owner's Guide will be changed in the next printing to indicate that tire inflation pressure recommendation for the "Safari" is 24 lbs. front and rear, cold. While these are equipped with 7.60-15 4-ply rating tires, it has been found more desirable to use the 24 lb, pressure than the 26 lb, given in the owner's guide. Start using the new recommendation at once.

NOISY OIL PRESSURE GAUGE

A buzzing noise which comes from the oil pressure gauge, or the line from the engine to the gauge, can be corrected by disconnecting the line at both ends and blowing air into the gauge end to remove oil from the line. When the line is reconnected it should be tightened securely at both ends before the engine is started.

BODY TO FRAME INTERFERENCE

The following body and frame interference points have been found as contributing factors in the amplification of road, body and differential noises. These points should be carefully checked before further diagnosis or corrective action is undertaken.

- A. Possible interference at the pinch weld of the rear quarter and rear deck floor to the rear bumper face bar supports and frame at kickups.
- B. Insert an insulating pad between the rear deck floor and fuel tank. (See page 78, June Service Craftsman News.)
- C. Possible contact of fuel line near left rear spring front hanger to both frame and floor pan.
- D. Possible interference at rivet that secures the left rear spring front hanger to both frame and floor pan.
- E. The right side lower engine splash apron contacting #2 crossmember.
- F. Possible flexing of the right side toe board.
- G. Remove #4 or #5 inner body bolt (whichever is applicable to individual body styles) from early production cars. Reference Pontiac Service Craftsman News, May, 1955 page 56.

CARBURETOR PUMP ROD ADJUSTMENT CORRECTION

Under "Pump Rod Adjustment" page 72 of the June Service News, the distance from the top of the air horn casting to the BOTTOM of the pump rod should be 1-1/16". This specification is listed incorrectly as from the air horn casting to the top of the pump rod. The same correction should be made on page 74 under "Adjustment Specifications".

AIR CLEANER STUD - CARTER FOUR BARREL CARBURETOR

If the air cleaner to carburetor stud pulls out of the carburetor body, it is usually caused by the stud not being threaded deep enough into the body. It is not always necessary to replace the carburetor body in such a case. The threads in the body should be cleaned up by using a 1/4"-20 thread tap. If necessary, also clean the threads on the stud using a 1/4"-20 thread die. All metal chips should be thoroughly removed before reassembly.



RATTLES IN LIFT GATE IN OPEN (HORIZONTAL) POSITION 1955 Pontiac 2564DF "Safari"

If rattles in the lift gate supports are encountered when a station wagon is driven with the lift gate in the open (horizontal) position, the supports may be reworked to eliminate excessive movement of the lift gate as follows:

- 1. Remove right lift gate support.
- 2. At a distance 3/16" above the original slot in the support used for locking the lift gate in the open (horizontal) position, make an additional slot of the same size. See Fig. 1. The use of this new slot in the right lift gate support when locking the lift gate in the horizontal position will eliminate any looseness between the inner and outer channels of the supports. Slot can be made as follows:
 - a. At required location on outer channel, drill pilot hole and file support to obtain required slot size.
 - b. Clean off metal particles which result from drilling and filing operations.



- 3. Peen the support rivets "A" to remove excess play between the support channels and their attaching brackets.
- 4. Reinstall right lift gate support.
- 5. Remove left lift gate support, peen around the support rivets and reinstall support.
- 6. Notify owner to use the new locking slot when driving the car with the lift gate in the open (horizontal) position.
- 7. The lift gate is not designed to be set in the full open position when car is being driven.
