
## Safarians Gather in Clovis, CA




# Get Ready for Social Media It's Here!

#### **Brooklin Model's Safari**

#### Some Assembly Required!

Small, shinny and mighty, Brooklin Models of Great Britain scores a hit with their recent release of their 1957 Pontiac Star Chief Custom 2 door Safari wagon. Sporting a Fontaine Blue and Kenya Ivory paint job, this highly detailed 1/43 scale model is impressive to view and heavy to hold. Made of solid cast metal, it tips the scale at nearly half a pound!

The accuracy on this small model is amazing. Far too often 1/43 models are out of scale or modified to better suit production goals. Brooklin Models remained on task by keeping everything true to scale. But attention to detail and high-quality comes with a price. You can purchase this limitededition model directly from

Brooklin Models for approximately \$220.00 Order from their website at www.brooklinmodels.com. Look for BRK227.

Looking for the best small scale model of a Safari wagon? Then look no farther than Brooklin Model's BRK227. As Starr Evans says...... It's a beauty!

Brooklin Models order processing is fast. You can expect your Safari in just a few days. The Safari comes in an impressive high quality box - mounted on a sturdy platform. When you open the box, you should see a view like this (right): ......

Using the fabric pull tabs provided, you can safely lift the model out of the box. You will immediately notice that the Safari is attached to a platform. This is done not only for display purposes, it's also intended to secure the model during shipping and storage. Well, as you can see in the next photo to the right, when the Safari breaks loose from its mount during shipping, the model breaks into pieces! Ouch! The overturned Safari looked like it had a bad day on a Los Angeles highway!

Tom Young ordered not one but two models. One from Brooklin Models direct and another from a USA distributor. Sadly, both models arrived in a state of disassembly. It seems that the first batch of models were made with a single screw that was used to hold the model onto the display platform. The model shipped by Brooklin Models broke free of its mount. Like wet clothes in an old clothes dryer, the model spun round and round causing many of its highly detailed parts to fall of

the body. The shipping box had plenty of insulation and was not damaged. The second model shipped from a USA distributor faired a bit better. The mounting screw held but the top of the wagon broke off. When Rich Pye heard the news, he exclaimed ....... "Make it into an El Camino"!

Tom immediately notified Brooklin Models of the damage found from both shipments. Their response was very prompt and supportive. Tom was offered a full replacement Safari for the one they shipped. He declined opting for the opportunity to restore the model back to its former glory. With some old model glue and a powerful magnifying glass, Tom was able to assemble the model (shown below) back to factory standards (pictured at the top of this page).

While patching a paint chip on the spear insert, he used a few drops of factory Kenya Ivory paint and to his surprise, he found that the paint used by Brooklin Models was a near perfect match to the factory color. Now that's modeling accuracy!


Tom also discovered that Brooklin Models mounting screw where perhaps a bit too short. Using a longer screw, the model now seems firmly secured to its base. Brooklin Models representatives listened to Tom's experiences and has made assurances that their model will no longer break away from the base during shipping. Some assembly will


# Saving Shrunken NOS and NORS Gaskets

Awhile back Nutmegger Ray Gravelin contacted me about intake manifold gaskets for his award winning 1955 Star Chief Custom Catalina. Ray was freshening up the engine compartment and needed new intake manifold gaskets to cure a small leak in the exhaust crossover area. It seems that the replacement gaskets he used when he rebuilt the engine burned out because they did not have the same stamped shim steel center section as the original gaskets, see below.



Ray asked if I had any, or knew of anyone who had some original type intake manifold gaskets. Unfortunately I could only suggest the usual vendors of NOS (New Old Stock) and NORS (New Old Replacement Stock) gaskets. Ray contacted Walt Damm who found an NORS McCord set on eBay and Ray quickly bought them. When the gaskets arrived and were placed on the engine for fitment checks, Ray found they had shrunken considerably over the many years since they were made. These old gaskets were essentially unusable as they were, the holes just didn't line up, please see picture below.




Both Ray and I have had some success expanding cork gaskets by soaking them in water, but had never tried soaking paper ones. Ray did some searching around and came up with the name Sandy Olsen, an old time gasket seller from Washington State. Ray said, "When I told him my problem with the McCord gaskets he said let me call you back. He did in about 45 minutes. He had the same McCords in stock. They were shrunken too. He said he poured boiling water on them and they elongated quite quickly. He said do the same but only be careful not to go over them a second time or they get too long." Ray taped his down in a shallow pan. He then traced the holes with a Sharpie so he could watch the progress. He used about 2 cups of boiling water and the results were good."




The picture on the left shows the traced hole locations before the boiling water was added The picture below shows the dried out gaskets taped down in the shallow pan. Ray said the gaskets were under the boiling water for

only about 3 minutes before they expanded to the



proper length! Needless to say you don't want to leave the water in the pan too long or the gaskets will become too long.

The picture below shows how much the NORS gaskets expanded, the hot water was dumped out at just the right time.

I want to thank Ray for sharing his helpful experience with us and for documenting the process by taking some great pictures along the way. You can see from the picture to the right that Ray is one who likes to do things right. Oh, if only our '55 Star Chief looked that good under the hood. His '55 is beautiful!

If you have discovered any "tricks of the trade" over time, please don't hesitate to share them with your fellow Nutmeggers. I'll even do the write up for you if you like. Of course pictures help but aren't necessary.

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
