
Our Chapter President has a simple recommendation for your consideration, "see you at the National Convention!"



Rich started his day by picking up this son, Robbie, while making the 300 mile drive from Northern California to Clovis. The show was great. Before the trophies were awarded, Rich had to leave early to drop his son back home. The next stop for Rich planned was a stop in Redding to enjoy some great food at the Black Bear restaurant. But his trouble free trip was about to end. As Rich pulled off the freeway in Redding, he heard a "tinny rattle" sound from under the hood. He opened the hood and saw that the engine idling rock solid but he could hear cylinders firing one at a time. Something was wrong. It seems that one cylinder was not running. Rich realized that he was approximately 118 miles away from home. His auto insurance would only cover 100 miles of free towing so, Rich decides drive to the next rest stop, then call for a tow. With a misfiring engine. Rich drives his wounded Safari slowly to the rest stop only to find that it was closed. The next one was about 100 miles away! Now he needs to make a big decision. The following day, Rich removes driver side valve cover and finds that the tip of the #5 cylinder intake valve lifer rod tip had broken off. 

Friends often described him as great guy with a wonderful smile. Richard owned a customized 1957 Safari wagon. He would drive with his family to many POCI events in the mid-west.

Here is more of Richard's life history:

Richard (Dick) Lee Nemechek of WaKeeney, KS went on to be with the Lord on November 13, 2020 at the age of 70. He was born to Louis and Johanna (Gaschler) on July 25, 1950 in WaKeeney, KS. He was united in marriage to Carol Henning on May 17, 1975, and spent his life as a resident of WaKeeney, Kansas.

Feature Story: It's All In The Details-1956 Style!

Inevitably, questions about the authenticity of a Safari restoration to "factory" condition will pop-up during any POCI National Convention. It is the details that may create disagreements. Conversations start to flow hard and fast like a mountain river flooding during a spring winter snow melt. Usually, the person with the best evidence and convincing story earns the respect from others.

When in doubt about restoration details, refer to first-hand evidence such as photos, publications and factory information. Such information is often hard to find and often not easily available when you really need it. The good news is that some Chapter members are very knowledgeable and can be a good source for help. The Pontiac-Oakland Resource Center and Museum always has great information. Don't forget that newsletters can also provide some great information too. Just keep reading... it's all in the details!



Look closely at this photo. What do you see that is different from production Pontiacs of 1956? This answer is

Above: Although this is a copy of a small ad, once you have closely looked at the picture and carefully reviewed the text, you will find that you are looking at the world's largest lighted Pontiac advertising sign!

largest of its kind in the world. Recently lighted in Kansas City, Mo., it is over 83 feet long and 67 feet high. The picture

of the Pontiac is 70 feet long and according to the builders of the sign there is more than a half mile of neon tubing in it.

The grill! Note that rather than the indentations pressed into the stamped steel grill as seen on most production Pontiacs, this grill has moldings attached.


Why? Perhaps this Pontiac is likely an early production vehicle initially used as a promotional display car.

There is no doubt that plenty of photos were routinely taken of early production Pontiacs. Although many photos may have been lost through time, some survive. Photos capture the factory appearance which is valuable to folks looking to restore their cars with a high degree of accuracy.

Some early production photos provide very little written details. They may not have a description, date, location, or photographer identification. But just like a jig-saw puzzle, if you keep trying to find and fit pieces of a puzzle, eventually you will complete the puzzle. So, when you look at the next page, you will see another early photo. Take a good look at it. You might find some of its details interesting.

Here is a personal question for your consideration.

When you were looking at the photo above, what first thing that caught your eye? Was it the glamorous model or the Pontiac?? Hmm....

You have just viewed an original, untouched photo from a credible photographer who took photos of early production 1956 GM products. With such providence, consider using this photo to help guide you with the restoration of your car. Note the following:

- · Under hood fiberglass insulation, color & texture.
- · Finish colors of the bolts.
- · Location of radiator tag.
- · Label on the passenger side valve cover.
- · Hood to fender rubber bumper stop, located ONLY on the inner fender near the radiator support bar.
- · The matt finish on the air cleaner and the location of the service decal.
- · The black gloss finish on the hood spring & cad/silver finish of the spring assembly.
- · The rare accessory "Tri-Tone" horn.

Restoration is not an easy task. Just looking at this early photo is likely not enough. Since Pontiac regularly updated their components through the production year, some components may look different in later model Pontiacs. In fact, some components may not be easily interchangeable between early and later production cars. 1957 Pontiac are notorious for having well over 100 different variations of component production and assembly! Fast forward to present times, during the restoration process, early, mid, and late production components can easily be mixed into the restoration. Thus, it is especially challenging to achieve a perfect fresh restoration.

So, what notable feature seen in the photo has not been mentioned? It is probably one of the most important features particularly, if you are looking for evidence to date this photo! Look at the grill! It has the "add-on" moldings attached to the grill which was not adopted for mass production. Once again, *it's all in the details*!


