



Lou Calasibetta, CSC President, called the meeting to order at 11 am.

Members introduced themselves.

2014 minutes of the chapter meeting: Were printed in the newsletter after last year's meeting. Minutes were distributed for review and comments. Motion to accept as printed made by Starr Evans, seconded by Jim Bowers and approved by membership.

2015 Treasurer's report: 6/20/14 Starting balance \$2073.50, Income \$1217 (dues), Expenses \$1290.63 (2014 and 2015 convention trophies 101.24, 2014 convention snacks and postage 53.47, Web site domain 70, Printing 4 newsletters 640, Postage 4 newsletters 376.42, Envelopes 16.20, returned check and fee 33) to give 7/23/15 ending balance as of \$1999.87.

2015 Membership report: Current number of registered families/members is 67. Maximum membership in June 2014 was 62 registered families/members.

Old Business:

Chapter TShirt:

Current inventory: 3X-four, 2X-none, XL-none, L-none, Medium-three, Small-two. Discussion at 2013 and 2014 convention chapter meeting discussed either having more printed or a new design. The concern is that having more made with the current design would cost \$600-\$700 and since most members have the current design we might have a stock slowly moving. Discussion ensued about a new design. It was decided to email the general membership 4 options: Keep the current CSC Logo design but don't put the Safari on the back so people could have their own car individually screen printed on it OR Use the 1955-1958 Pontiac Script from the older design Tom Young has with Custom Safari Chapter on it and 4 Safari Travel Logs OR 1955-1958 Pontiac Script with the Custom Safari Chapter on it and nothing on the back or front OR members can suggest a design. Once we have a design, Starr can check with her vendor about cost, members would need to preorder and if a woman's T-top design would have to be requested.

Newsletter Support: Lou recognized and thanked Rich Pye for his time, energy and dedication to the chapter newsletter. The chapter newsletter is our main commodity and mechanism to connect members. It is important to support him with articles and short briefs. Tom Young will work with Marvin Morton on an article about disk brake conversions. Starr encouraged members who attend a car show to send a picture of their car at the show and a short write up about it. New regular features: Robin is going to send a new member update to Rich for each newsletter and will write up the Member of the Quarter questionnaires and send to Rich. Robin can also remind those with email of the deadlines to send information to Rich for the next newsletter. It was suggested that anyone who has GM Tech Bulletins specific to the 55-58 Safaris submit a copy to Rich for the newsletter. Noel has some for 56, 57 and will send. Lou has some for 55 and will send to Rich.

- Brake discussion: Jack White shared the 57 Buick wheel cylinders work on the 57 Transcontinental and gave more breaking power. Mark Petry discussed when getting new brake drums that having them arched to fit the brake drum make them more effective by increasing the contact area to 100%. Noel shared that the tolerances can be dialed into the arching making. Rear brakes in mid-70's GM station wagon axel flange is the same width and better shoes.
- Tom Young has a California person looking for a fully restored 57 and is willing to pay up to \$60,000 and to contact him with any leads.
- Lou Calasibetta knows of someone selling a 57 in New Jersey that is not running for around the mid-teens. Members discussed the challenge of finding good reproduction parts and when members do that would be good information to share in the newsletter.
- Robin said this kind of discussion is what members need and is there a member that could set up a discussion thread on the internet for this kind of communication. Tom thought Randy Kerdoon might be a good resource and can talk to him.

Members at the convention to meet Saturday, July 25th at 1pm at CS popular vote class area to vote for the "Best Safari" at the convention and determine which member drove their Safari the longest distance.

Noel Evans made the motion to adjourn the meeting which was seconded by Tom Young and the meeting adjourned at 12:12pm.

Actually there were almost EIGHT 1957 Custom Safari wagons at Mike Green's 2015 annual Wounded Warriors show at the classic Bob's Big Boy Broiler in Downey in late August.



Some of the highlights....new Safari members Cornell and Susie arrived in his freshly restored blue '57, a frame off restoration that took over 2 1/2 years and was the only "frame-off" in the group. His efforts were rewarded with one of the show's "top ten" awards


