

Survey Coming! Electronic Newsletter Distribution.

Our email version of the newsletter will generally arrives 3 to 6 weeks in advance of the printed newsletter. It is issued in PDF format which means that your computer must be set to read PDF files. Since the cost of emailing a newsletter is dramatically less than printing & mailing, annual dues will be adjusted to a lower cost, depending on how many members elect emailing for their preference. The printed newsletter offers a thick glossy paper with colorful graphics and photos. No need to log-on or have Internet access. So, the choice is yours! **Robin will be contacting you for your preference**.

Annual Chapter Business Meeting Report

The Mohegan Sun Resort in Uncasville, CT was a great place for Safarians to gather for our Annual Chapter meeting. Our Vice President Rich Pye and Editor, Tom Young were unable to attend the Convention. But we were in good hands with our Secretary/Treasurer, Robin Petry and President, Lou Calasibetta, (pictured right). With a meeting agenda in hand, they reported on all our Chapter's essential business. Without their leadership, we would not have one of the best world-wide chapters of the POCI.

Here is Robin's report:

July 14, 2021: Custom Safari Chapter Meeting Minutes, Uncasville, CT.



15 Members in attendance: Lou Calasibetta, Mark Petry, Robin Petry, Lee Hadley, Ruth Hadley, Carl Loftis, Jack White, Jill White, Starr Evans, Henry Hart, Andrea Cook, Bill Walkinshaw, Carol Walkinshaw, Wheeler Bradley, Kathleen Bradley.

7 Guests in attendance: Dana Thomas, Sue Petry, Karl Petry, Don Lemay, Ralph Keller, Ron Maurer, Ron Scott.

President, Lou Calasibetta, called the meeting to order at 2:02 pm. He welcomed everyone members and guests introduce themselves. He recognized members who have died over the last year: Aspen Pittman, Richard Nemechek and Barry Zalesky.

Meeting Minutes: 2019 chapter minutes were published in the Summer 2019 newsletter. Starr Evans made a motion seconded by Carl Loftis to approve as published. Motion passed with no votes against. There was no 2020 Chapter meeting since the convention was held virtually. 2021 Chapter meeting minutes will be published in the 2021 Summer newsletter.

Treasurer's Report: Robin Petry submitted the following treasurer's report: 4/16/20 starting balance was \$2,191.65. Income \$2,131.09 (Dues = \$1,914.80, T-shirts = \$216, Checking acct interest = 0.29). Expenses \$1,323.21 (3 newsletters and postage = \$1,225, Web Hosting Fee = \$77.21, Deposit error = \$21). Ending balance as of 7/14/21 = \$2,999.48.

Membership Report: Robin Petry reported the current roster as of 7/14/2021 is 101 dues paying members/ families but 10 have not renewed for 2021. 10 new members joined since July 2020. Those not renewed have been sent reminders through text, email, and mail. If they have not renewed after the Spring Newsletter goes out, they will be removed from the roster. Of the current 101 members/families, 10 are not POCI members = 10% of our membership are not POCI members.

Editor's Report: Robin reviewed Tom Young's editor report that was published in the electronic version of the Spring newsletter emailed before the convention. The hard copy will be mailed after the convention and will include 2 extra pages that could not be included electronically by Tom due to internet issues. He welcomed CSC member, Dennis Dana, to the newsletter publishing team and they will collaborate on articles. Since he will not be able to attend this year's POCI convention, he encourages all to submit pictures and details of events.

Old Business:

<u>PayPal</u>: Robin reported that it was offered as an option for paying for dues and t-shirts. Overall, it went well. 16 people used it to renew dues or pay for club t-shirts = 16% of members. 5 had fees deducted but that only came to \$4.87 and Robin felt this was reasonable to be able to offer this convenient option to members.

<u>Facebook</u>: Tom Young has been managing our Facebook page. He reports that it has doubled in size since the last report and is now at 220 members. Due to Facebook changing guidelines that anyone can join a public group without permission, he is changing the status to private so members must request to join and assure they have a sincere interest in Safari wagons.

<u>T-shirts</u>: We still have an adequate stock. Robin will talk to Tom about offering to those on our Facebook. For those who purchase at this convention, the \$4.50 shipping fee is waived.

New Business:

<u>Group emails from Robin Petry</u>: Robin reviewed that when a member wants to share information or ask a question of members, she can send out a group email. It will look like it is only sent to her but that is because all members are blind copied to avoid regularly displaying members email addresses and channeling replies to just her or the person needing information.

<u>2022 officers</u>: Lou Calasibetta is willing to serve another year as president, Tom Young is willing to serve another year as the newsletter editor and Facebook manager, Rich Pye is willing to continue to serve as vice-president and webmaster, Robin Petry is willing to continue to serve as treasurer/secretary. If other members are interested in those roles, they can self-nominate and contact any of the current officers.

<u>Questions/Discussion:</u> The club newsletter printing and postage is the main chapter expense. Starr Evans opened discussion among the group and following options considered: 1. See if there were members who would prefer to receive the newsletter electronically versus in print. Many members like the hard copies and collect them but some may prefer just electronic. 2. Continue color printing for all pages, keep the front and back pages of the newsletter in the thicker, glossy paper but change the inside to normal weight paper. 3. Consider different dues structure for choice of receiving electronic versus hard copy newsletters. After group discussion, a motion was made by Starr Evans and seconded by Carl Loftis to have Robin Petry survey members to see if there are members who want to receive the newsletter only by electronic means. For now, no change in the newsletter paper or club dues' structure.

Best Safari Award and Long-Distance Award: Chapter members to meet at the Custom Safari popular vote area at 11am on Thursday, July 15th to vote for the best Safari among chapter members and present the Best Safari plaque to that member and award the member that drove their Safari to the convention the farthest distance with complimentary dues for 2022.

Meeting adjourned at 2:54pm.



Most everyone will agree that temperatures in our Country have increased. Summers are hotter and longer lasting. Now, add the fact that we are not getting any younger, many members are beginning to rethink about driving their factory original, non-air-conditioned car to conventions. Some simply have growing health limitations that hold them back from long travel. In essence, many of us are getting too old to enjoy our national conventions that traditionally have been held during the middle of the summer season.

So, why do we continue to hold national conventions in the middle of the summer? That is a million-dollar question!

Once upon a time, many decades ago, during the early years of the POCI, much of the membership was under 40 years old. Many folks were raising families. Schools followed a traditional calendar which started in early September and ended in early June. The weather was generally much cooler than now and with our abounding youth, warm summer season temperatures were not much of an issue.

Fast forward to today, our club officials have recognized the need to recruit the next younger generation of members to assume the benefits of our club including ownership of Pontiacs and managing the club's future direction. But at this point, most of our convention attendees have grey hair, some have no hair! Although some recruitment success is evident, it is the grey hair folks who dominate our conventions. With no kids to raise, or worry about school schedules, many members have talked about why we continue to have conventions during the heat of the summer season. Perhaps it is time for our leadership to take action so that we can meet during a cooler time of the year. May or early June seems ideal.

We all understand that our club is limited in their ability to pick dates and venues that are best suited for us. Costs, consumer demands on venues, support from local chapters, location rotation, venue features, and much more all factor into the decision-making process. It is a huge challenge to meet.

Please let us know your thoughts about the timing of our future national conventions. Should they remain the same or would you like to see the timing change from July to some other time? Your brief reply is greatly appreciated.

If we receive enough comments, we will send a letter to the POCI leadership to show our support for fostering change in convention date selection.





1955 Pontiac Safari— Another One Saved!

A new member shares a story about getting his 1956 Safari back on the road.

Back around the mid 70s, my '56 Safari was owned by a friend of my older brother. He often took it to the Baylands Raceway in Fremont, California. Wednesday night grudge races let you race against other amateur racers. During one of those races, my brother's friend blew up the 389 c.i. motor so, he offered the car to me for \$650. When I told my father about the car his ears perked up and he said, "let's go take a look at it."

The motor had 12.5-1 pistons with a Crane cam. It ran really well. The interior had two bucket seats and shag carpeting, perfect for a teenager. The car also had American aluminum slot mag wheels.

I had a lot of fun driving my Safari but after 6 years of driving, she was parked after I suffered from a seizure. My driving days we're put on hold.

Thankfully, my epilepsy got under control with time and medication. My old girl waited patiently while I recovered.

She is a pretty straight car and never been in a accident as far as I can tell.

I recently decided that it was time to give her some well deserved love so I started to get her back on the road.






I have pulled the motor, transmission and front clip off to clean as much of the frame as possible without pulling the body off the frame.

The front suspension is my first project. My plan is to paint the firewall and frame after replacing some worn parts. So far, I've replaced the king pins and put on a disc brake conversion. The motor is going to be rebuilt with the compression ratio down to 9.5 to 1, and a stroker kit from Butler Performance to up the size to 461c.i. I am also thinking of a newer trans with overdrive, probably a 700r4.

My plan is to change the paint from the original salmon color & white to a blue & white two tone combination.

Technical Tip #12

If you maintain a factory air cleaner on your 1955-57 Safari wagon, you are familiar with the oil bath system that cleans incoming air. The design works well. However, the filer does require constant maintenance. The oil must be changed when it becomes dirty and the wire mess filter assembly has to receive a good cleaning which can be a bit awkward and time consuming.

Not along ago, Curtis French, was restoring his father's 1957 Chieftain 2 dr hardtop when he came across the idea of updating the air cleaner with a modern fiber filter element. After hours of time in a local California parts store, he found the perfect fit, a fiber filter that requires no modification to fit 1956-57 Pontiac oil bath air cleaners.

The bottom line...... If you want to eliminate the use of oil in a factory air filter assembly, consider use of a modern fiber air filter.

The fiber filter that Curtis found is from the highly rated NAPA GOLD line of filters. It usually costs less than \$40 and may be in stock at large Napa Auto Parts stores.

Use of the fiber filter requires no modifications to the air filter housing or carburetor mounted stud. The fiber filter will seal against the top of the air filter assembly once the top is firmly in place.

Although changes in engine performance are unconfirmed, one test using a vacuum meter showed approximately a 2% to 3% increase in engine vacuum at idle with the fiber filter vs the factory wire mesh. The engine used has a burnt valve and rebuilt carburetor.

Quick Reference:	1956-57 Pontiac Air Filter Modification
Where to buy:	NAPA auto parts stores, country-wide.
Parts Number:	6255 Most large stores will have it in-stock. (Other manufactures may offer a similar size filter)
Estimate Cost:	From about \$32 to \$38 new, (tax not included).
How to apply:	Simply remove the oil and mess filter from the air cleaner. The new filter will self center.


