America on the Move: 50s Fins and Chrome

CARLISLE, PA - America's love affair with fast and flashy automobiles took center stage on U.S. postage stamps with the Oct. 3 issuance of the America on the Move: 50s Fins and Chrome stamps. The new 42-cent stamps are now on sale at the local Post Office, by telephone at 800-Stamp-24, or online at usps.com.

Featuring paintings by renowned automobile illustrator Art M. Fitzpatrick, the stamps showcase a 1957 Chrysler 300C, a 1957 Lincoln Premiere, a 1957 Pontiac Safari, a 1957 Studebaker Golden Hawk and a 1959 Cadillac Eldorado. The stamps were rolled out at the Fall Carlisle Collector Car Swap Meet & Corral during a first-day-of-issue ceremony in Carlisle, PA, at 12:30 p.m. ET.

"Automotive history is brilliantly illustrated on these awesome stamps," said Patrick R. Donahoe, U.S. Postal Service Deputy Postmaster General and Chief Operating Officer. "We are proud to feature these classic cars on stamps here at the mecca of car shows."

Donahoe was joined by Carlisle Events co-founder Bill Miller, Jr. to dedicate the stamps before a crowd of thousands of automotive enthusiasts.

After the ceremony was concluded, Noel and Starr and the owner of the Lincoln were asked to leave the cars on display for the remainder of the day. They were happy to do so. People came by all day to check out both cars. Some people in the morning wondered if the cars were the "give aways" for Fall Carlisle. Noel & Starr quickly set them straight on that notion!

The Postal Service inaugurated the America on the Move series in 2005 with the 50s Sporty Cars stamps that depicted a 1952 Nash Healey, a 1953 Chevy Corvette, a 1953 Studebaker Starliner, a 1954 Darrin and a 1955 Ford Thunderbird. All these paintings were also done by Art Fitzpatrick.

Noel and Starr Evans were thrilled to have their 1957 Custom Safari on the stage at Carlisle for the firstday-of-issue ceremony. It was the climax to a story that began at the Greenville, SC POCI Convention in 2005. It was then that Art Fitzpatrick first spotted the Evanses' Safari and left a note on it asking for Noel to call him. Art had been commissioned by the Postal Service to do the paintings for the America on the Move: 50s Fins and Chrome stamps.

Noel, of course, said he'd be delighted to have Art take pictures of the Evanses' car for the possible inclusion in the stamps series. Who wouldn't? Art was careful to tell the Evanses that he could not promise the painting of their car would be selected by the Post Office, and even if it was, there was no guarantee that the car in the painting would be the same colors as the Evanses'.

Noel and Starr had brief contacts with Art by phone after that first encounter in South Carolina. Then at the POCI Convention in Tulsa, OK, Art announced that the Post Office had selected their car for the stamp series, and it would indeed be Fountain Blue and Kenya Ivory!

That was July 2007, from then on Noel and Starr dealt with Mark Saunders of the Postal Service. He kept them informed of the expected announcement date and the first-day-of-issue date. Those dates kept changing for one reason or another, primarily because Mr Saunders had a problem finding a venue for the big events. Finally, Starr suggested to him that he try Carlisle Events or Hershey, and even gave him the web sites for those two venues. After all, that's where the car people go. Mr. Saunders then made the arrangements with Carlisle Events for a Spring 2008 announcement and a Fall 2008 first-day-of-issue ceremony. The Evanses were asked to keep the picture of the stamp confidential until the formal announcement, which, by the way, was very hard for them to do.

Now that the stamps are on sale at local Post Offices, you can all enjoy them. Art Fitzpatrick certainly does beautiful work. Just in case your local Post Office is already out of the stamps, you can order them online or by phone.

The Vice Prez Sez!

"Fix Your Safari Right" by Bud Stowers

The current edition of Old Cars Publications' "Price Guide" lists the fully restored value of our Safaris as follows: '55 - \$3,500; '56 - \$3,300; and '57 - \$3,700.

Sounds good, doesn't it? The problem is that most people, including many in our chapter, don't understand what is meant by the term "fully restored". It is meant to describe a car part inspected for wear, and those showing wear have been replaced with N.O.S., excellent repro/replacement parts or their equivalent. Everything has of course been cleaned and reassembled to factory specifications, all chrome replated or replaced, and last not least, all surfaces inside and out have been refinished to original type and colors of paint per the cowl tag code. Any vehicle that has undergone this type of restoration can truly be referred to as "fully restored" and should actually be better than new because it has become a "hand built" car. Nowadays the cost for such a restorations runs \$4,000 and up; so obviously, there is no quick money to be made doing this extensive of a job and then running the car through the auctions.

However, in my opinion, it is a good long term investment since the value of our Safaris is doing nothing but going up while the number of cars in good condition continues to dwindle. Because of their extreme rarity, I look for their value to eventually top that of the Nomad. What I would most like to do in this brief article is to advise our chapter members of the pitfalls of cutting corners to save a buck. Dollars well spent for quality for work or merchandise is the only dollars well invested in these cars. Putting body putty over rust, for example, is a complete waste of time. The only cure for rust out is cutting the area out and welding new metal in. For maximum value, interiors should be restored with original type materials. "Fix 'em right" now, and head for the big Safari Round-up at Pontiac, Michigan this June. Even if your car is only half done, bring it if you can. People respect the fact that you're working on it. You can bet I'll be there!

All the photo work is in color with some outstanding shots of Bill Garren's '55 Safari and Debbie Watson's '57 2dr Safari (neither of whom are CSC members) as well as Tom Gann's fantastic '57 Bonneville.

Speaking of fantastic '57 Bonnievilles, chapter member Lou Calasibetta's beautiful F.I. convertible got the full treatment in a recent issue of Special Interest Autos, including many photos, a drive report, and capturing the cover of the magazine. 
